STUDENT SPOTLIGHT



REINA SULTAN

Reina Sultan is a fourth year Political Science major with a French minor who participated in UCDC Spring 2015. I recently sat down with Reina to discuss her experiences in the program.

While in Washington, D.C., Reina served as a research assistant at the Woodrow Wilson International Center for Scholars. She worked with Robert Worth, a *New York Times* journalist and Beirut Bureau Chief on a book about the Arab Spring. Reina used her Arabic skills and provided translations of protest videos for Mr. Worth. Another scholar with whom Reina worked is Lawrence Altman, Ph.D. With Dr. Altman, Reina conducted research for a project examining the increase of mass media coverage of world leaders' health and the influence of that coverage on the public and political realms.

Reina's internship helped her to develop important skills and working relationships, as well as opportunities to attend lectures at the Wilson Center. In just ten weeks she was able to hear (and occasionally meet) the elite of D.C. and the world, from visiting professors and Supreme Court justices, ambassadors and presidents.

Reina had similar experiences in the UC Washington Center, where she attended regular Monday night center forums. These events provide informal opportunities to meet with Washington, D.C. movers and shakers, including Supreme Court Justices Ruth Bader Ginsburg, Anthony Kennedy, and Stephen Breyer, Washington Post Columnist Ezra Klein, and former CIA Director James Woolsey. Reina joked that she and her roommates went for the free food, but stayed for the impressive speakers. She listed her favorite speakers during her quarter as Thea Lee, AFL-CIO Deputy Chief of Staff, and UCDC's own Associate Academic Director Marc Sandalow. Mr. Sandalow presented on D.C.'s often scandalous history and Hollywood's various interpretations of the city (think: *Scandal* and *House of Cards*).

Reina also had the unique experience to serve as a student advocate for the 2015 UC Advocacy Day. Along with staff and other UC students, Reina braved the spring rains and exorbitant Uber fares, dressed in her best suit, to advocate for an increase in state and federal student financial aid, with particular emphasis on summer aid. She lobbied members of Congress from both sides of the aisle, drawing upon her experience as a first generation college student reliant upon financial aid to fund her education. The three day event broadened her horizons; she very much enjoyed the experience, reporting that "even though I'm very aware of financial aid...because it's something that's obviously gotten me completely through college, I never thought about it in the grand scheme of things."

The ultimate highlight of her UCDC experience, however, came at the UCDC Networking Night. Held at the UC Washington Center and the Beacon Hotel, students had the opportunity to network with influential UC alumni in D.C. and make valuable connections. Reina stated that without a doubt, this event changed her life. Her conversations with a UC alum, currently in the Foreign Service, influenced her to alter her path from law school to foreign service and international relations. In fact, if


forced to "delete everything from my UCDC experience, but choose one thing to keep, it would have been this [event]," she said.

Since returning to the West Coast, Reina's pace remains rapid. Reina is simultaneously completing her final year at UCSB, working as a supervisor at the Annual Fund, a research assistant for Dr. Jane DeHart, professor emerita in the UCSB History Department, and UCDC peer advisor in our office; how fortunate are we! If this is not enough, Reina is also applying to programs abroad to further her career, including the prestigious Fulbright scholarship to teach English in either Luxembourg or France.

WHAT'S UPCOMING FOR UCDC?

Whether it is pre-departure jitters about moving to the East Coast or concerns about applying for internships, we do our best to allay students' concerns through various workshops and preparatory meetings. Beginning early in each quarter, we hold a series of information sessions where we explain what the UCDC program is, how to apply to it, and some of its many benefits. This initial outreach has been very helpful for potential UCDC participants, but we recognized that more involvement from our office would help better prepare UCSB students for the Washington program and for life after graduation.

We are happy to be able to partner with Career Services for a workshop that is beneficial to students as they apply for internships and for jobs post-graduation. Our LinkedIn,Cover Letter & Resume Writing workshops offer students a chance to learn the fundamentals of applying for jobs. In this digital age, a LinkedIn profile can either make or break candidates during the application process. Career Services walks students through setting up a profile and provides helpful "best practices" of maintaining a professional online presence. Additionally, we outline proper style, content and formatting for both resumes and cover letters in the workshop. We believe it is important to provide our students with the proper tools that will help guarantee their success in Washington, and our partnership with Career Services on workshops is one tool we implement to make that happen.
